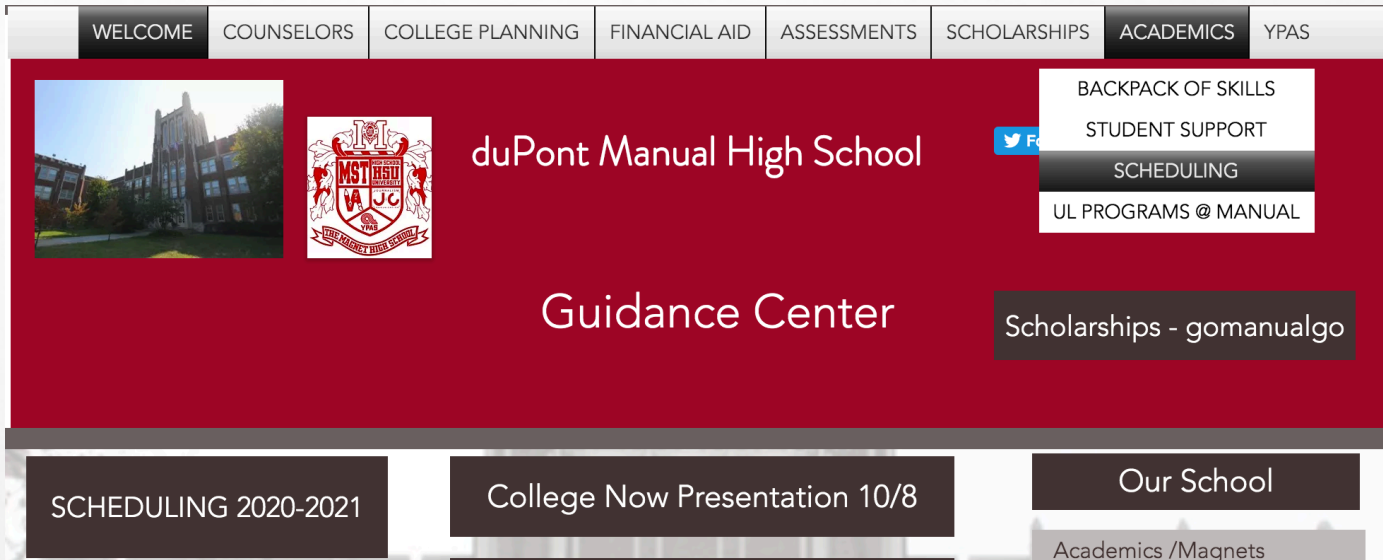




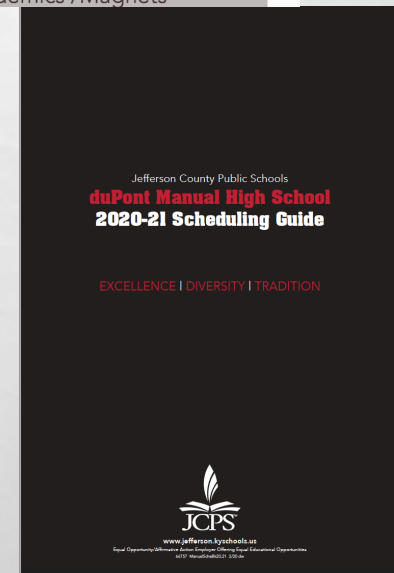

In terms of educational preparation, the college preparatory curriculum minimum unit requirements for regular admissions are

- 4 units of English
- 4 units of social sciences, including world history or a comparable course (second foreign language will satisfy one of the four required social science requirements)
- 3 units of mathematics (must include algebra I, algebra II, and one unit of either geometry, trigonometry, or calculus)
- 3 units of natural sciences, including two courses with lab components
- 1 unit of foreign language
- 5 additional units of academic courses (We recommend courses in fine arts or computer literacy, with additional courses in mathematics, natural sciences, and foreign language.)

The University of Alabama reserves the right to refuse admission or re-enrollment or to place conditions on admission or re-enrollment of applicants and former students who it determines represent a safety risk to University students, employees, and University property. Academic Preparation

While our admissions process is holistic, most successful candidates will present a curriculum that includes the equivalent of five academic subjects each year for four years. Recommended course work includes 4 units of English, 4 units of mathematics, 4 units of natural science, 2 units of foreign language, 2 units of social science/humanities, and 4 units of additional course work in these areas, or other academic courses such as engineering science, computer science, social science or natural science research, or advanced work in the humanities. Close attention will be paid to the rigor of course work presented. It is highly recommended that candidates applying to the School of Engineering have taken calculus and calculus-based physics.

COURSE LEVEL DESCRIPTIONS – P. 7

The JCPS Advance Program is an incentive program to encourage students to take more rigorous, accelerated courses.

- Complete 12 advance program and/or AP courses in high school.
- Complete 3 years of the same world language, or two years of two different world languages.
- Complete one of the following: ADV History Arts, AP Art History, Spanish Humanities, 3 VA courses, or 3 YPAS courses.
- Students must maintain a 3.0 GPA to remain in the program.
- Students do not have to be Advance Program to take advanced courses.

- AP courses are college-level courses taught in high school
- AP courses have college level reading and writing assignments and have the most rigorous test and homework assignments.
- While taking an AP course, you may elect to take the AP exam for that course and possibly earn college credit if the college you will be attending will accept AP scores.
- AP classes are weighted – it is a good way to raise your GPA if you are successful in the course.

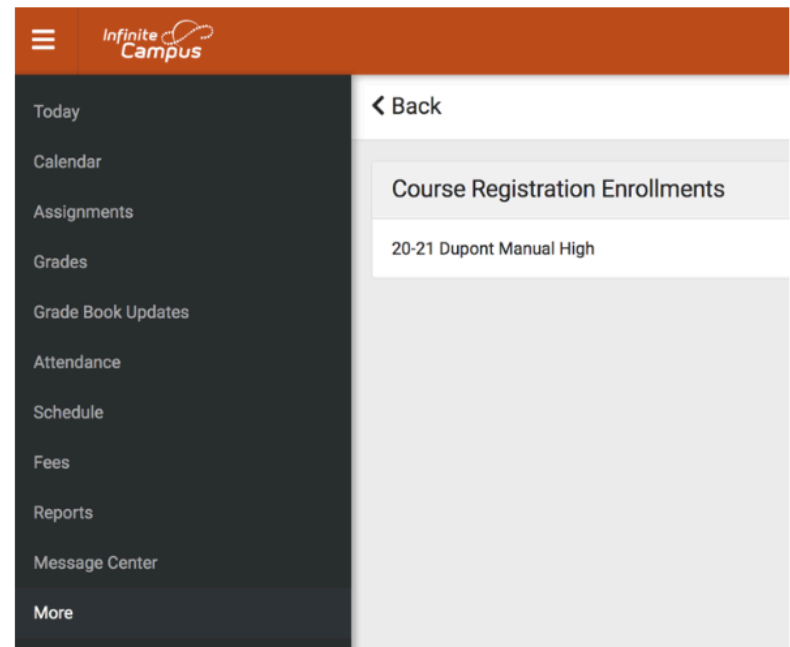

2. Place your signature and have parent/guardian place signature on appropriate line.
3. Select 8 classes and note them with an 'X'. Teacher initials in core classes.
4. Choose 3 alternate classes for your electives by writing A1, A2, & A3 in the X column.
5. Students must enter 8 courses and 3 alternates in the Infinite Campus Student Portal.
6. Return the completed Student Course Request form to the Guidance Office by **Friday, March 20**.




4. To begin adding course requests, click the [blue] **Add Course** button.
